COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Grass identification is difficult even for the professional botanist! Why even bother?! The grass family is the third largest family in the world, species occupy every continent, and grasses are one of the most important aspects in all of human civilization! The class will focus on the characteristics for each grass tribe (The grass family is so big that it is divided into tribes.) common in Rocky Mountain National Park. There will be a classroom component, but majority of the class will be enjoyed outside in the field.

COURSE LEVEL: II

Short distance walks throughout the day on primarily level terrain. Second day will be in the alpine but on level terrain.

Note: Portions of this class will occur above 11,000ft elevation.

BRIEF INSTRUCTOR BIOGRAPHY (additional information available at www.RMConservancy.org):

Denise has been an ecologist/botanist with the Colorado Natural Heritage Program since 1995 and has worked in the ecology/botany field since 1987. Since 2008, she has designed and conducted numerous plant identification workshops for US EPA, USDI BLM, USDA Forest Service, Colorado Parks and Wildlife, and the Colorado Native Plant Society. Prior to working for CNHP she worked for the Wyoming Natural Diversity Database and the Montana Natural Heritage Program. She worked for the National Park Service in several parks and monuments as a resource management ranger for five years. She has a B.S. degree in Botany from University of Wyoming and a M.S. degree in Biological Sciences from Montana State University. She has been the project leader for over 27 Colorado county surveys for critical biological resources and is lead author for the *Field Guide to Colorado's Wetland Plants: Identification, Ecology and Conservation, Common Wetland Plants of Colorado's Western Slope*, as well as the Colorado Wetland Mobile App.

EXPECTATIONS: Professional conduct will be expected from participants at all times. Individual ideas will be respected. Except during course breaks, cellular phones, pagers, and personal entertainment devices are strictly prohibited in the classroom and during field sessions.

CAR-POOLING:

Rocky Mountain Conservancy - Field Institute courses utilize car-pooling to limit vehicles traveling into the Park. Car-pooling makes it easier to keep the group together, reduces transit time, and allows courses greater access because fewer parking spaces are required at destinations. In addition, it provides an opportunity for participants to discuss course material in small groups during transit. Typically, a few participants from each course volunteer the use of their vehicles for car-pooling to course locations.

10:00 AM – 11:30 AM	Participants will review grass parts, grass terminology, and definitions with diagrams. We will begin the presentation of the grass family and other related families, discuss genus characteristics, and introduce genera using identification keys.
11:30 AM - 5:30 PM	Lunch and time afield for plant identification.

8:30 AM – 5:30 PM	Meet at Rocky Mountain Conservancy Institute, we will carpool to locations in montane, subalpine, and alpine to explore the variety of grasses.
5:30 PM	Wrap up and depart.

WHAT TO BRING:

- Sack lunch, snacks, energy bars, WATER (at least a quart)
- 10x hand lens (Diameter of 2 cm is most useful.)
- 15-cm ruler
- Field notebook (shirt-pocket size) and pencil
- A portable camp stool or chair if you have difficulty sitting on the ground
- Tweezers, or a safety pin (optional)
- Lightweight binocular (optional)
- Grass ID book

Note: Rocky Mountain Conservancy - Field Institute recommends that participants for all courses dress in layers and wear comfortable, sturdy hiking boots/shoes. Participants should be prepared for sudden changes in temperature and weather conditions.

REFUND POLICY:
